

Peace Day Centenary

Following the signing of the Versailles Treaty on 28 June 1919, the British government declared that Saturday 19 July would be a Bank Holiday to celebrate the Peace. According to the *Leeds Mercury* Huddersfield was 'en fete' over the Peace Celebration weekend, the mills closing on Friday noon. The newspaper report commented that this would have provided an opportunity for a 'mass exodus' to the coast if it had not been for a strike of railway workers. The strike also led to the cancellation of a football match at Elland Road between Leeds City and Huddersfield Town planned as part of the celebrations. There was, however, a large gathering in Greenhead Park with an open-air concert given by 2000 children and sports events. The town was decorated with flags and 'electric illuminations' including an illuminated tramcar with 1000 lights.

One hundred years on, both Brockholes and Honley are marking the centenary of Peace Day.

POPPIES AND DOVES – MARKING THE END OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR IN BROCKHOLES

HLHS member Yasmin Cross has sent us the following: 'On Sunday 14 July 2019, we intend to mark the centenary of the formal end of the First World War by remembering the people of Brockholes who took part in the War. We will remember not only the names on the War Memorial ('the Poppies') but also those who




returned ('the Doves'). There will be a small free exhibition in the Village Hall where many of the participants attended school. We hope to show details of places in the Village where they lived, worked, trained and played and we have some really interesting old photographs to display. Children from Brockholes School will be producing small posters which we hope local residents/businesses will display during the week leading up to the Peace Day centenary on 19 July. The Rifle Club and Ordinary Men Regimental Heritage Project will also be participating in this event. A

local art group will be displaying their work. The event will follow the Community Sing organised by St George's Church and will be open from 11.30am to 3.30pm. We will be running a First World War Tearooms and there will be a raffle. There will also be an exhibition showing details of archaeological investigations in this area over the last few years, which you should find very interesting. We hope you will join us at this event.'



And HLHS member Peter Marshall has produced a book for Honley Civic Society to accompany the commemoration. It costs £10 and will be available over the weekend and from the Honley Civic Society website.
