





EXHIBITION AT THE TOLSON MEMORIAL MUSEUM -A WOMAN'S WORK IS NEVER DONE

An exhibition of photographs of women at work in the 19th and 20th Centuries which captures their everyday hardships as they fought for equal opportunities and better conditions. These themes still resonate today with gender pay gap and equality issues all over the world, so it's important we tell the stories of these women's struggles in order to inspire current and future generations. The exhibition is part of the **We are West Yorkshire: A Celebration of People and Place** project supported by Arts Council England. The project brings together five exhibitions from the county's local authority museums (Leeds, Calderdale, Bradford and Wakefield), each celebrating some of the different qualities that make West Yorkshire unique. Kirklees Museums has drawn extensively from its digitised collection of over 60,000 local images to explore the lives of women from the region up until 1918, as well as a small selection of images from each of the other local authority services. The exhibition runs until 31 March 2020.

Riding the Storm: the political legacy of John Ruskin

Although John Ruskin eschewed direct engagement in politics, his influence on the character of late 19th and early 20th century political discourse was immense. Taking this as his starting point, Howard Hull, Director of the Ruskin Foundation and the Brantwood Trust, explores the universal reach of Ruskin's ideas and their continuing relevance to the nature of politics today. Whitley was the Liberal MP for Halifax 1900-28 and Speaker of the House of Commons 1921-28 and he named his own house Brantwood in admiration of Ruskin. This Whitley Lecture is the University of Huddersfield's contribution to Ruskin 200, a worldwide programme of events marking the bicentenary of Ruskin's birth.
